New Station Ignites Fresh Chapter for Satellite Beach Fire Department

On Friday, March 14th, Chief David Abernathy and the Satellite Beach Fire Department held a Hose Uncoupling Ceremony for the Grand Opening of the new fire station. A hose uncoupling ceremony is a fire service tradition and is similar to a ribbon-cutting. At our ceremony, the uncoupling of the 100 ft. hose symbolized the beginning of a new chapter for the

Satellite Beach Fire Department. Our new Station 55, the third station in the City's history, is a state-of-the-art 2-story, 11,967 square foot station and is connected to the existing Public Works facility at 240 Jackson Avenue. The opening of the fire station culminates a long term city project that began in late 2017 with the purchase of the land on Jackson Ave, and included the construction of our Public Works Facility in 2022, and finally the completion of the fire station this spring.

Station 55 was designed and constructed by W +J Construction and Tsark Architecture with the help of a 5 million dollar Florida Department of Environmental Protection Resilient Florida Grant. It includes 4 bays and associated offices, bunk rooms, kitchen and day room, utilities, parking, and landscaping. W+J and Tsark delivered a high -quality facility and better yet, stayed on time and under budget!

At the grand opening, residents and guests were able to tour our station. A few key highlights include a brass fire pole, a training tower, separate sleeping quarters for each firefighter on shift, a state of the art alerting system and ventilation system, and on-site special equipment for cleaning firefighter protective gear after a fire. Close proximity to the beach access at Grant Avenue enables water rescue equipment to be housed at the station as opposed to off-site.

Probably the most exciting aspect is the brass fire pole! Station 55 is only the second in Brevard to have a fire pole. During the Grand Opening Ceremony, Firefighter Lieutenant Eric Tippins shared a brief history behind the use of fire poles.

If you are ever driving on Jackson Avenue and see a firefighter rappelling down the wall of the station, don't be alarmed! The southwest stairwell not only serves as a secondary exit, but also as a training tower. The training tower can be used for a variety of training evolutions including search and rescue, fire standpipe training, rope rescue and rappelling, ladder operations, and ventilation operations. Our Satellite Beach Fire Department prides itself on staying up to date and highly trained in all aspects of fire rescue, and the training tower will allow this to happen on-site regularly.

The new alerting system provides "ramping tones" to personnel, reducing the stress of the initial alert of loud lights and tones. There are also status monitors throughout the station. These provide call location, mapping and weather and equipment status.

Recently, SBFD moved to a schedule of 48 hours on shift, and 96 hours off. With our three shifts of firefighters at the station for 48 hours at a time, it is important that the men and women of our SBFD have a home away from home. This includes separate sleeping quarters, a kitchen of commercial grade equipment, along with a custom dining table, day room, computer training area, and fitness room. Also included in the station are a medical treatment room, medical supply room, tool room, bunker gear area, and office space which allow our fire department personnel to continue to provide a wide range of services to our community including fire suppression, paramedic level advanced life support, technical rescue, hazardous materials response, water rescue, fire code inspections, public education and outreach programs, and our ever growing Community Medic Program.

I am so pleased with Station 55 and all that it offers, especially knowing that it was funded in part by a grant and came in under budget! It is a facility we all can be proud of. I know it will serve our SBFD well, so that they, in turn, can continue to serve the residents of Satellite Beach with the utmost skill, training, and care.

Origin of the Fire Pole In the late 1800s, firehouses were typically three stories tall, with horses stabled on the first floor, living quarters on the second, and hay storage on the third. Following the smell of food, horses often tried to climb the stairs, sometimes getting stuck on the way down, leading to the use of tight spiral staircases to prevent this—though these slowed firefighters. In 1878, firefighter George Reid slid down a wooden pole during hay emergency. Realizing it was faster than stairs, Captain David Kenyon of Chicago's first all-Black fire crew, Engine Company No. 21, convinced the department in 1878 to install a permanent fire pole at their station. The initial pole was made out of Georgia pine out of Georgia pine beam, sanded into a 3 inch diameter and given several coats of varnish and a coat of paraffin. Though initially mocked, the speed advantage became clear, and poles were adopted citywide. The first brass pole appeared in Boston in 1880.

A COMMITMENT TO E-BIKE SAFETY

In April, the Satellite Beach Police Department took a proactive approach to address the safety concerns of our community over the growing number of e-bike riders, by conducting an E-Bike and Bicycle Education and Enforcement initiative. With the rise in popularity of e-bikes, it has become increasingly important to raise awareness about the laws, rights, and responsibilities associated with e-bike use. Over the course of the month, our officers engaged with over 170 bicycle and e-bike riders, distributing more than 250 warnings.

Through these interactions, we not only reminded riders of traffic laws and safety rules, but also provided education to many parents, juveniles, and residents. During the initiative, some common questions and concerns emerged:

Frequently Asked Questions:

1. Do you need a license to drive an e-bike in Florida?

No, Florida does not require a driver's license to operate an e-bike. This makes e-bikes accessible to riders of all ages and abilities, as long as they follow the state's laws and local ordinances.

2. Can e-bikes be used on sidewalks in Florida?

Yes, e-bikes are allowed on sidewalks unless explicitly prohibited by local law. However, riders must yield to pedestrians and ride at a safe speed to ensure everyone's safety. It's essential to respect pedestrians and avoid accidents by maintaining control and being courteous to others on the sidewalk.

3. What traffic laws apply to e-bikes?

E-bikes are subject to the same traffic laws as traditional bicycles. This includes:

- Riding with the flow of traffic
- Obeying all traffic signals and signs
- Using hand signals when turning or stopping
- Riding in a predictable and safe manner

Additionally, helmets are required for all e-bike riders under the age of 16. Wearing a helmet is one of the simplest and most effective ways to reduce the risk of injury in case of an accident. As e-bikes continue to grow in popularity, it's more important than ever to prioritize safety. The Satellite Beach Police Department remains committed to both educating and enforcing laws, ensuring our streets are safe for everyone. Parents, too, play a crucial role by reinforcing these safety standards with their children. Together, we can create a community where safety and responsibility go hand in hand, allowing us all to enjoy the benefits of e-bikes while keeping our streets safe.

When Fronds Go Wrong:

Do's and Don'ts of Yard Waste Disposal

When you trim your palm fronds and other vegetation in your yard, it might be tempting to stack the debris on the storm drain or in the gutter. When placed this way, yard waste will often end up in our storm drains and pipes, clogging them and potentially causing flooding. When it decomposes in the stormwater system, vegetative debris may also contribute to nutrient pollution that harms our lagoon. Some points to remember:

Do... Put it in the Cart

- If possible, yard waste should be cut to lengths of four feet or less and placed in your green 96-gallon cart for collection.
- You may also use your trash cart for yard waste if it is not mixed with household trash and set out on the correct day for vegetative debris pickup.

Don't...

- · Don't place yard waste in plastic bags.
- Don't mix in other debris that is not yard waste (such as wood fencing, doors, landscaping timbers, etc.).
- Don't obstruct or conceal fire hydrants or water meters.
- Don't place vard waste on vacant lots, City streets, medians or

Do ... Put it by the Curb

- If you are unable to fit yard waste in your cart, you may place it by the curb.
- When placing vard waste at the curb for collection, do not place it on or in storm drains or in any manner that could obstruct drainage. Place it behind the curb and off the road and gutter.

Do... Report Issues

- If you see a clogged storm drain, report it to Public Works at (321) 777-2309 or email sbpwprojects@satellitebeach.org.
- If you see improperly managed yard waste, report it to the Community Development at (321) 773-4409 or email cdd@satellitebeach.gov.
- Remember: Yard waste generated by landscape contractors or tree removal workers must be disposed of by the contractor.





PROJECT STATUS

- The South Basin Stormwater Improvements project is complete. The project saw the construction of various best management practices (BMPs) to improve water quality in discharges to the lagoon. Treatment swales and a retention area were constructed throughout the southern region of the city, and a nutrient filtration box was installed at the Sports Park. New stormwater pipes were installed to replace failing pipes along Rosada St.
- Floating wetlands were installed in the City Hall pond. These are designed to remove nitrogen and phosphorous from the water prior to discharge into the lagoon.
- The Roosevelt Ave Baffle Box, a new-generation nutrient and debris filtration device, is under construction.
- The Jackson Avenue Streetscape project is slated to begin in October.
- Road resurfacing occurred at Delaura Middle School during spring break. Resurfacing of concrete roads throughout the city is still in progress.

Satellite Beach Urges Residents to Prepare for Active Hurricane Season

As June marks the start of hurricane season, NOAA predicts an abovenormal number of storms this year. The City of Satellite Beach encourages residents to take early action to protect their homes and community. Start with an emergency plan that includes evacuation routes, shelter options, and a communication strategy. Prepare a supply kit with essentials like nonperishable food, water, medications, flashlights, and important documents in a waterproof container. Property prep is equally important. Trim trees to remove weak or dead branches—NOAA notes even a Category 1 storm can

snap large limbs. Trees that are near power lines pose a serious risk; they can bring down lines, cause power outages, and in some cases, spark fires. If branches are close to utility lines or need significant trimming, contact a licensed arborist. Secure large outdoor items like furniture and playgrounds, and clear your yard of grills, potted plants, and debris to prevent them from becoming dangerous projectiles. Residents are also reminded of the fertilizer ban from June 1-September 30. Avoid using nitrogen or phosphorus fertilizers, as heavy rains can wash pollutants into storm drains. Keep storm drains clear of leaves, clippings, and yard waste to help prevent flooding. Stay informed through Brevard County alerts and monitor local weather. Early preparation is the best defense—protect your home and help keep Satellite Beach safe.



Skip the Fertilizer Compost Instead



Composting at home is a game-changer for your garden! By recycling food scraps and yard waste, you create nutrient-rich compost that improves soil health, enhances moisture retention, and reduces the need for chemical fertilizers. Worms play a crucial role in this process, breaking down organic matter faster while enriching the soil with their nutrient-packed castings. This organic boost feeds beneficial microbes, leading to healthier plants, stronger root systems, and more bountiful harvests. Plus, composting reduces landfill waste and lowers your carbon footprint, making it a win for both your garden and the planet!

Manage your grass clipping keep them on your lawn, it feeds your grass the nutrients it needs naturally, blowing the clippings onto the street, curbs or sidewalk can carry harmful bacteria from dog feces





Fertilizers are banned from June 1 to September 30th to protect the lagoon from pollution during rainy season.

Rain carries the nutrient into the lagoon, which harms seagrasses and wildlife!

Nesting Season for Coastal Birds Has Begun!

Obey local ordinances regarding pets on the beach (The City of Satellite Beach does not allow pets on beaches).

If you see wildlife being disturbed call FWC Wildlife Hotline at 888-404-FWCC (888-404-3922)

Never intentionally force birds to fly (causes stress, uses reserved energy, and can result in nest/chick abandonment).






